



2025 Summer Camps Guide

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There are a ton of summer camps in the greater Milwaukee area—too many for just one handout! Please note that many of the camps have their own scholarship programs to make these experiences accessible to all youth.

Overnight Camps: Camps Specializing in Foster & Kinship Youth

Belong Wisconsin's Sibling Camp

Appleton, WI | August 17–22, 2025

Sibling Camp is a special place where youth in foster care regain a sense of permanency and connection by strengthening their sibling relationships. Camp Erin Chicago (*grief*)

Chicago, IL | July 11–13, 2025

Camp Erin is the largest national bereavement program for youth **ages 6–17** who are grieving the death of a significant person in their lives. They get to attend a fun camp and participate in grief education and emotional support—at no cost to families. Led by grief professionals and trained volunteers, Camp Erin helps children to increase levels of hope, enhance self-esteem, and learn that they are not alone. Camp Mariposa Chicago (*substance use disorder in family*)

Chicago, IL | Various dates

Camp Mariposa is a free year-round addiction prevention and youth mentoring program for kids **ages 9–17** who are affected by the substance use of a family member. Children attend weekend camps up to six times a year (not just in the summertime) and participate in fun, traditional camp activities, as well as education and support sessions led by mental health professionals and trained adult members. 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Camp Reunite (*incarcerated parent*)

Grafton, WI

Camp Reunite is a weeklong summer camp serving youth **ages 8–17** who have a parent currently incarcerated in the Wisconsin Correctional System. Using trauma-informed care practices in a supportive camp setting, Camp Reunite provides children with coping skills, conflict resolution strategies, and increased resiliency. Through extended and meaningful visits to correctional institutions, children can reconnect with their parents. As all children are in the same situation, Camp Reunite is a place of unparalleled acceptance and understanding. Visit

Holiday Home Camp

Williams Bay, WI

Holiday Home Camp provides one-week sessions that serve more than 700 children in **grades 2–8** who are from economically disadvantaged communities. The camp provides traditional summer camp activities, including swimming, tubing, archery, arts and crafts, dance, outdoor education, recreational sports, campfires, campouts, and much more. Royal Family KIDS (RFK) Camp

Racine, WI | June 16–20, 2025

The Royal Family KIDS Camp specializes in children with a history of kinship or foster care, or abuse or neglect. RFK is an overnight camp for children **ages 7–11** who are currently in the foster care system or who have been in foster care in the past. Teen Reach Adventure Camp (T.R.A.C.) Milwaukee

Teen Reach Adventure Camp offers three-day, single-sex camps designed for youth **ages 12–15** who are at-risk and often reside in foster care. The camp allows participants to experience the outdoors, while also learning teamwork and participating in activities that build trust and self-worth. Overnight Camps: Camp for All Kids (Campership Program)

Camp for All Kids provides diverse elementary and middle school children with the opportunity to attend 4- and 8-week overnight camp experiences at 6 partner camps in northern Wisconsin. Camperships are renewable, so campers are guaranteed a spot to return to camp each summer through their CIT (counselor-in-training) year. This pathway provides up to 7 summers of camp experience for participants! The only cost to participate is an annual \$200 family commitment payment, which is flexible depending on ability to pay. Scholarship Opportunity: Camps for Kids

Camps for Kids provides a one-time scholarship to qualifying youth so that they may attend an overnight, residential camp in Wisconsin. All foster children qualify, and kinship children generally qualify due to receiving either subsidized childcare or participating in BadgerCare+. If you aren't sure if your children qualify, just give us a call.

Students must be **ages 8–15** at the time of the camp session and must also meet the following criteria:

1. First-time participant in the Camps for Kids program
2. Full-time resident of Milwaukee County OR children in foster care through the Division of Milwaukee Child Protective Services (DMCPS)
3. Family that qualifies for Foodshare/SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) and/or Wisconsin Share Childcare Subsidies
4. All foster care children, Medicaid, and W-2 recipients are eligible. Proof of enrollment/eligibility must be submitted with the camp application.
